
Write down how the story could go on. Then read the continuation of the story in the classroom. Talk together about how Max and his family should behave.




Hot as fire - where are the fire sources?

Enter in the left column of the table all sources of fire which you have identified together. Discuss then in class how we should behave properly in order to prevent a fire. Write your answers in the righthand column.



This is how it works.

- 1. Print out the cards on thick paper or glue them on cardboard.
- 2. Cut out the cards.
- 3. Lay them on the table face down.
